Crimes of murder, forcible rape, and aggravated assault that show evidence of prejudice based on race, religion, sexual orientation or ethnic background will be reported if they occur.

**-NOTES-**

1. The annual reporting period was from July 1 until June 30 for each academic year, but is now recorded in October.
2. The term “Campus” includes any building or property owned or controlled by the institute of higher education within the same reasonable contiguous geographical area and used by the institution in direct support of, or related to its educational purposes; or any building or property owned or controlled by student organizations recognized by the institution. “Campus” also refers to reasonably contiguous property used by students that supports institutional purposes such as food court, certain non-campus buildings or property, and public property.
3. For the topic ARRESTS, only arrests for the listed offenses are required to be reported by the Campus Security Act of 1990.
4. Statistics are from COXHEALTH SYSTEMS SECURITY reports only. Local Police statistics are not available for these periods.

**MAJOR CRIME DEFINITIONS**

Criminal Homicide-Non-negligent Manslaughter - The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Arson: Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Robbery - The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Burglary - The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes, this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned--including joyriding.)

Weapon Law Violation - The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations - Violations of state and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or

cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, Methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzadrine).

Liquor Law Violations - The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Hate Crime – Any crime motivated because of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, or disability of victim or victims.

**SEXUAL OFFENSES DEFINITIONS**

Sex Offenses (Forcible) - Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

Forcible Rape - The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

Forcible Sodomy - Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or not forcibly against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Sexual Assault with an Object - The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

Forcible Fondling - The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person’s will; or, not forcibly or against the person’s will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Sex Offenses (Non-forcible) - Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

Incest - Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

Statutory Rape - Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

\*\*Disability—defined as a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more of a person’s major life activities; being regarded as having such an impairment; or a record of having such impairment.

\*\*Sexual orientation—defined as male or female heterosexuality, homosexuality, or bisexuality by inclination, practice, identity, or expression or having a self-image or identity not traditionally associated with one’s gender.

**CAMPUS SECURITY REFERENCE**  
**TITLE II OF THE STUDENT'S RIGHT TO KNOW**  
**AND CAMPUS SECURITY ACT OF 1990**

This public safety report is to inform students, employees, perspective students and employees, and parents about public safety, crime statistics, security policies and procedures at CoxHealth Systems and to further goals and efforts to provide a safe campus.

**1. Current campus policy regarding procedures and facilities for students and others to report criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on campus and policies concerning the institutions response to such reports.**

A. CoxHealth Systems provides 24-hour Security Services for students, employees, and visitors.

B. The Security Department may be contacted by several different ways. You may contact Security at the North Campus by dialing on any in-house phone #69-3715. If any emergency should arise, you should contact the hospital P.B.X. dialing 269-3000. You can provide the operator with the information regarding your situation. If you need immediate assistance, tell the operator you have a STAT situation. Operators will forward this information to the Security Officer on duty.

C. The Security Department at the South Campus can be contacted by the same means as at the North Campus. Security Department numbers are #69-4620 or #69-6120 using the in-house phone system or 269-6000 to reach the P.B.X. Operator. Free hospital phones and elevator emergency phones are available at numerous locations for quick call capability to Security Departments of Cox North and Cox South.

D. A report on all incidents will be filed by the Security Department. Further information will be forwarded to the local police agencies or departments. All reports are investigated, and reports distributed to the proper administrative personnel.

**2. Security and access to campus facilities and security considerations used in the maintenance of campus facilities.**

A. Security monitors all parking facilities at the Cox Health Systems North and South Campus through a closed circuit TV system and through periodic rounds. The College of Nursing Residence is also monitored on a routine program that will be determined by the Director of Security and the Director of the Campus.

B. The College of Nursing Residence has outside doors on automatic lock.

C. Uniformed Security escorts will be provided to students and employees of the campus upon request. This will be limited to on campus facilities as well as campus parking facilities. This service can be obtained by contacting the Security Department.

**3. Security policies concerning campus law enforcement, including Chief Executive Officer, the enforcement authority of Security personnel, and policies which encourage accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the campus Security Department.**

A. The campus Chief Executive Officer is Robert Bezanson. The Director of Security is Joe Rushing. The Campus Security Administrator is Rod Schaffer. Crime Analyst Officer is Walt Woods.

B. The Security Department for CoxHealth Systems campuses operates on a very strict guideline concerning campus law enforcement. All Security personnel are commissioned Law Enforcement Officers. Requirements include prior law enforcement employment and training and certification, meeting the Department of Public Safety requirements for State Certification.

C. All campus Security personnel have a close working relationship with all local law enforcement agencies. All investigations of a criminal nature are reported to all local police agencies.

D. Campus Security Department requests that all campus crime be reported at once. This will assist in having a prompt and complete investigation. All campus Security personnel will complete

all reports before ending their tour of duty so that proper law enforcement agencies and administrative personnel may be contacted.

**4. Campus Security procedure for informing student and employees about campus Security procedures and practices.**

A. Campus Security Department provides information to all students regarding policies and safety issues. All new students will receive information during orientation regarding campus Security and crime prevention.

B. Cox employees and students must take an active role in their personal safety and security. Each individual is expected to function responsibly concerning his or her own safety as well as toward the security of personal possessions. Individuals should always lock all valuables in a safe place. When walking at night, always try to walk in a group or at least in a party of 2 persons. Always walk in a lighted area. Never go in areas that are off limits. Whenever you feel necessary, ask for a Security escort. Keep a close watch on your fellow campus students and employees. Report any suspicious activities to the Campus Security Department at once. Keep all doors locked on your automobile as well as your living quarters. Be responsible for yourself, and follow all safety guidelines.

**5. Description of programs designed to inform students and employees about the prevention of crimes.**

A. In addition to the annual inservice provided to students, the Security Department is involved in ongoing programs to make students and employees aware of crime prevention.

B. Additional programs on self-defense are offered frequently through the Springfield Crime Prevention Office and are open to all students and employees as well as to members of the community.

**6. Statistics concerning the occurrence on campus during the most recent calendar year of the following criminal offenses reported to campus Security authorities beginning July 1, 2006 to all student and employees. Statistics are included in this brochure and published monthly in the campus newsletter.**

- A. Homicide
- B. Manslaughter
- C. Forcible & Non Forcible Sex Offenses
- D. Aggravated Assaults
- E. Burglary
- F. Motor Vehicle Thefts
- G. Arson
- H. Hate Crimes

**7. Campus Security Policy concerning the monitoring and recording through local police agencies of criminal activity at off campus student organizations whose participants are students of the institution. Off campus organizations are those recognized by the institution.**

A. Campus Security will work with and monitor all local police agencies concerning criminal activities by student organizations.

B. A report of all off campus criminal activities will be provided to the proper administrative personnel.

**8. Campus Security will provide statistics concerning the number of arrests for the following crimes occurring on campus to all students and employees.**

- A. Liquor Law Violations
- B. Drug Abuse Violations
- C. Weapons Violations

**9/10. A statement of policy regarding the possession, use, and sale of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs and enforcement of federal and state laws.**

A. Students of the College of Nursing are subject to the Drug-Free Schools policy as established by the College. A copy of this policy will be provided to each student during orientation. Additional copies are located in the Student Success Services Center.

B. The policy is intended to encourage all employees and students to seek treatment for alcoholism and other drug dependencies and to prevent the illicit use of drugs and the abuse of alcohol. The transfer, sale, or use of alcohol or other drugs is prohibited on any of the Health Systems or College premises. Students and employees in violation of this prohibition will be subject to disciplinary actions up to and including dismissal, as well as the possibility of the hospital pursuing legal prosecution. The legal sanctions under local, state, and federal law may include, but are not limited to imposition of fines, probation, incarceration, imprisonment, and/or community service requirements.

C. Students and employees will be offered assistance related to information on availability of counseling and rehabilitation programs. This information is available through the Student Success Services Center.

**11. Description of drug or alcohol-abuse education programs**

A. The College of Nursing provides programs for education on drug and alcohol abuse. During orientation, information is provided on recognizing the risks and symptoms for drug and alcohol abuse. Within the curriculum, classes are scheduled to provide additional information on specific health affects due to drug and alcohol abuse as well as treatment options. The College Counselor is available during posted hours for counseling and assistance with referrals.

**12. A statement of policy regarding the institution's campus sexual assault programs to prevent sex offenses, and procedures to follow when a sex offense occurs**

A. If a sexual assault occurs, the complainant should report the incident immediately to the Security Department. Officers in the department will provide emergency response immediately. The complainant is reminded of the importance of preserving evidence as proof of criminal sexual assault as well as remembering as much about the assailant as possible. She will be informed of her options to notify local law enforcement authorities, as well as her option to have Security Department officers assist her in such notification.

B. Individuals who have been sexually assaulted will be advised of local community programs available to them.

C. The individuals involved may request a change in academic arrangements due to circumstances surrounding the offense. Assistance will be given in making these changes if the options requested are reasonably available.

D. Established internal disciplinary procedures will be followed in investigating and dealing with the incident. The case may also be handled through the criminal justice system and sanctions can include criminal penalties. Both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any disciplinary proceedings regarding alleged sexual assault.

E. A program or video is offered annually by the College of Nursing to promote the awareness of rape, acquaintance rape, and other forcible and non-forcible sex offenses.
